We quote on the hoof at 60 to 70 cents per pound for net meat, as in quality</p> <p>Sheep sell at \$18 to \$20</p> <p>Butter \$3 to \$3.50 per pound</p> <p>Corn sells by the quantity at \$1.50 to \$5.00 per bushel</p> <p>Corn Meal retails from the graneries at \$5.75 per bushel</p> <p>Copperas sells in the small way from store at \$1.75 to \$2 per pound</p> <p>Cotton 60 to 65 cents per pound</p> <p>Eggs sell at \$2 to \$2.50</p> <p>Flour the market is poorly supplied, and prices continue to rule high. We quote small sales from store at \$65 to \$66 per bbl. for superfine</p> <p>Fodder \$8 to \$10 per 100 pounds</p> <p>Hides Green 75 to 80 cents Dry \$1.60 to \$1.75 per pound</p> | <p>Leather Sole \$5.50 to \$6 Upper \$6.50 to \$7</p> <p>Lard sells by the bbl. at \$2 to \$2.10 per pound.</p> <p>Molasses Retail from store at \$12 to \$13 per gallon.</p> <p>Nails by the keg, \$1 per pound</p> <p>Osnaburgs \$1.60 per yard</p> <p>Poultry Chickens \$1.50 to \$2 each, as to size Grown fowls \$2.50 to \$3 each</p> <p>Potatoes Sweet \$6 to \$8 Irish \$10 to \$12 per bushel</p> <p>Rice Clean, 18 to 20 cents per pound</p> <p>Salt is in fair supply, and we quote sales of Sound made during the week at \$18 per bushel, as in quality</p> <p>Sugar by the bbl. \$2.25 to \$2.50 per pound</p> <p>Sheeting Fayetteville factory, \$1.60 to \$1.65 per yard, by the bale</p> <p>Spirits Turpentine \$2 to \$2.50 per gallon</p> | <p>Tallow \$1.75 per pound</p> <p>Yarn retails at \$20 to \$22 per bunch</p> <p>Wood is in demand, and sells by the boat load at \$18 to \$20 per cord</p> |
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
